the other three were done at a later date to illustrate styles not adequately shown; unfortunately nobody has recorded which the three were and each one has the date of the dress attached."

Beatrice Powell and her sister must have dressed

some of the dolls, but it is not known when they began. It could have been when they were little girls or not until they were grown. They gave the Powell dolls made after 1853 to the Bethnal Green Museum.
